Marks of our brokenness

We cannot live as we would dearly wish and truly should (read Romans 7:14-25)

We cannot free ourselves from unhealthy dependencies for love and recognition from others (read Luke 14:26).

We cannot cope in a Godly way with our day to day troubles—the big ones offer us an opportunity to be heroes but the minor annoyances just get in the way and reveal our pettiness. (read James 1:2-4)



We struggle to be honest and transparent because we fear that others can be as judgmental and dismissive as ourselves (read Matt 7:1-3)



Befriending our brokenness

“...brokenness is, in fact just as intimate a part of our being as our chosenness and our blessedness, we have to dare to overcome our fear and become familiar with it. Yes we have to find the courage to embrace our own brokenness, to make our most feared enemy into a friend and to claim it as an intimate companion”. - Henri Nouwen
